Assumed command of H&S Company, Basic Infantry Training Battalion, 2nd ITR on April 6, 1967 and served in that billet until discharge on January 31, 1969. The Commanding Officer of BITB was Lt/Col James L. Day. Jim had been the XO and then CO of 1/9 during my entire period in Vietnam as well. Jim retired as M/Gen. On January 21, 1998. President Clinton awarded him the Medal of Honor for an action that had occurred at Sugarloaf hill on Okinawa May 14, 1945. Jim was not only the finest Marine, but the finest man, I have ever known.

Life with my wonderful wife, Val; watching my daughters grow into beautiful women and being "Baba" to my grandchildren. I am active in my Homeowners Association.
